Medical reviews	4 children	As per the medical recommendations, 4 children were taken for review in the month as scheduled and all are in stable conditions. Bahati being one of them is rapidly responding to the surgery and is now in position to move with minimal support.	All review dates need to be observed and medical guidelines issued need to be observed. The children under this programme are closely monitored for any changes in health.
General medical care		During the period under review we were able to register only 18 children who required medical care and a majority of whom had infections such as flue and cough and this was properly managed. Two of the children had sores resulting from positioning and these are now healing.	This was a reduction compared to the previous month and most of the conditions are as a result of cross infection since the children mix up all day. The therapy team to closely monitor the care givers while they execute their duties to ensure that the positioning guidelines are adhered to.

Drop in clinics	4 drop in clinics	Five new cases were registered during the drop in clinics in the period under review while for the continuing clients, there has been positive development in the abilities displayed by their children from the time they started undergoing the therapy	Some of the children have advanced in age and are most likely not to adopt to the therapy hence may only need other daily living skills to cope up with life. Increase in the fuel prices has led to a drop down in the number of clients received due to high transportation costs.
Outreach clinics	2 clinics	All the two clinics were conducted as planned. During the Busede outreach, eight new clients received and registered for medication and 2 new cases clients were registered for the therapy services while in Buwenge 3 new clients were registered for medication	Three new cases that could not be served by Home of Hope were referred to other implementing partners based on their conditions. Misinterpretation of prescription leads to wrong medicinal uptake hence causing other side effects however clients are also encouraged to contact the medical team for proper guidance.

Daily medication	36 children	37 children under the care of the home receive medication on a daily basis due to the chronic illnesses they have in life and these have epilepsy, sickle cells and HIV/AIDS and this has kept them in good health given the proper uptake of medication and care.	Care givers are advised to closely monitor their health with the support of the medical team and report and changes the children develop for proper management.
