Drop in clinics	4 drop in clinics	Five drop in clinics were conducted and twelve new cases were registered and according to them, they got to know the services through the recommendation of those who benefited from the service. Through the clinics care givers are able to share experiences and also receive counselling from the social team. The activity also helps to strengthen the bonding between the care giver and the child since it encourages the care givers to spend more time with the children.	The increase in the number of clients benefiting from the programme is notable however, some of the clients are inconsistent in turn up which affects the progress or impact of the activity on the children. Much as we offer little transport refund to the clients, it's not proportional to the actual costs they incur hence causing the inconsistency in participation since they cannot afford the weekly expense

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		new clients were taken through counselling to enable them easily identify themselves with the old clients and also prepare them to psychologically handle the various situations that they come across in their day to day life. Home based therapy	Resident	With the support of the care givers, the therapy team has helped build the capabilities of children through daily therapy drills which has reduced on the risk of development of secondary disabilities such as contractures among the children. Some of the children are now able to perform daily living skills such as movement from one place to the other, feeding and also hygiene improvement such as toileting among others.	Noticing the changes among the children needs time and patience and the care givers together with the therapy team need to be persistent with the strategy if we are to register positive results. The number of the children in need of therapy is overwhelming hence the number of hours spent on each child is limited to enable the team reach out to every child.
Outreach clinics	2 out reaches	The Busede outreached attracted two new clients while the Buwenge outreach attracted one new client and those who have been on the programme for some time reported improvement in their day to day lives as a result of continued uptake of the medication. During the outreaches, clients in need of counselling and guidance were	One client in Bused was referred to the regional referral hospital for further management since her condition (mental) could not be manged by the team. The long distances moved by the clients to the outreach points affects

Some of the clients are from the neighbouring districts and therefore prefer that the services be extended to their areas for easy access.
Education and skilling	Formal and non-formal skills	During the month under review the school going children where engaged in numerous activities that included accomplishing their holiday packages with the support of the social team and also involving them in practical skilling activities such as art and craft where they were able to develop their capabilities in making productive art work that can help them even earn a living in the future. As a result the children came up with a variety of art pieces such as bracelets, bangles, ear rings and paintings among others.	Some of the materials used to produce the art pieces are quite expensive yet these are necessary for the children to perfect their skills hence higher costs incurred in the procurement of raw material. Some of the children are slow learners hence more time is taken in making them understand the various techniques.
Routine medication	40 children	As a result of proper and continued uptake of medication with the close supervision of the medical, social and the therapy team, the children receiving daily medication have been in a steady condition and these include those with HIV and epilepsy. There has been no events of seizures also reported during the period under review.	The children's progress and response to the medication needs to be monitored closely by all key players to avoid short comings. Medical recommendations made also need to be adhered to by all players.

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Referrals	None	Due to their medical conditions (sicklers) two children were referred to other facilities for blood transfusion, a service that is not offered at our medical facility. Currently they have all recovered having got the service	There is need to lobby for the establishment of a blood bank at the facility to avoid further occurrence of such situations and also reduce on the risks that may surface during the process.
Therapy outreaches	4 therapy sessions	A total of five therapy outreach sessions were conducted and there has been an improvement in the turn up of the children participating in the programme. Care givers have also reported improvement in the capabilities of the children since they receive more frequent time for therapy and the programme has helped equip the care givers with more skills in therapy compare to the monthly programme before.	Some care givers attribute the inconsistency in attending to the exercise to the current season which has kept them more engaged in the gardens and also impacted on the transportation costs they incur due to the poor road network
Stake holders' meeting	One meeting	With the support of sub county stake holders, one stake holder's meeting was conducted to share the progress of the action points developed during the previous stake holders meetings held and this involved all the sub county leadership ranging from the town clerk, LC III, representatives from the police, councillors for disability at sub county level, health sector and the community based services sector. The meeting yielded into the development of another follow up action plan that is to be	The participants were able to share key challenges they were facing during the implementation of the previous action plans and also raised concerns that needed to be addressed by each stake holder. Some of the stake holders have been using schools as the entry point for advocacy and sensitisation and this was affected by the holiday

As per the reports presented by various stake holders, there has been a great improvement in the level of engagement and participation in various development programmes by persons with disabilities at all levels	programme, however, with the re-opening of the schools at the end of the month, more efforts shall be school focussed. Local leaders and opinion leaders at grass root level also need to be followed up to assess their progress.
Home based activities	Variety	The children together with the care givers and other departmental staff members have been engaged in various activities that promote team building and also enhance the children's growth such as games, both indoor and outdoor, community engagements among others. These have been key in strengthening the relationship among all parties and also supported child development.	Children need to be given more time to play as a tool in helping them discover more of their abilities. Due to the heavy rains, more outdoor activities have been affected especially the community engagements due to the poor roads. The previous volunteers also helped establish more engagement skills that have been passed on to the entire staff for implementation.
Child development	Develop care plans for all children	On a weekly basis, the care givers led by the Therapy team and other administrators share/discuss the progress of the previous care plans made and also develop new care plans for the children. Each care plan is developed based on the child's capabilities and a thorough assessment of the child is done by the entire team.	It's the role of all staff members to keep registering all the positive and negative effects of the children's care plans developed such that necessary adjustments are made for improvements.

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Income generating activities	Poultry and dairy	The two projects have supported in improving the children's nutrition and have also minimised expenditure of the organisation while the biproducts are being used as manure in the gardens where green vegetables are grown for the children's consumption. The surplus products are sold out for income to support in a few needs of the children.	There is need to expand on the projects if we are to increase on the yields. For better and sufficient utilisation of the biproducts there is need to set up a bio gas system which will help reduce on the cost of fuel and electricity used for cooking
General medication	25 children	This time round 23 children were treated indicating a reduction in the number of children compared to the previous month. The most common illnesses were those that can easily be transmitted through body contact such as cough and flue while others were as a result of chronic illnesses like sickle cells. A few malaria cases were registered during the month under review.	More precautions need to be taken to avoid further infections. In the bid to perfect their mobility techniques, some the children are able to reach the isolated ones hence making it difficult to maintain the strategy.
Medical reviews	6 children	All the six children taken for review were in stable condition and these were cases of hydrocephalus. As a routine, the management was able to observe the set review dates and also follow the previous recommendations made hence ensuring their good health.	Staff is to abide by the new recommendations made and also follow the new review dates set.

- Pray for the establishment of learning institute for Physio therapists and Occupational therapists

- Pray for acquisition of specialised therapy equipment
- Pray for the furnishing of the guest wing
- Pray for more provision in abundance at the home to be able to meet all home needs
- Pray for the establishment of more income generating activities within the home for sustainability
